Let's Read: Reading suggestion by Carol McAdoo: The Librarian of Burned Books Brianna Labuskes Emotionally moving WWII era historical novel about the importance of books, libraries, and friendship to sustain us in difficult times, while also offering a stark and relevant warning about the dangers of censorship. The author writes about the intertwined fates of three women who believe in the powers of books to triumph over the very darkest moments of war. Timely reminder that the burning or banning of books is the first step in an escalating war on freedom thought and expression of that can have devastating results. Novel described as an expertly crafted piece of literature that reminds us of the perils of censorship, the power of books, and the duty we all have to stand up for the freedoms we hold dear.
